<b>Murr</b> P. 9 860132	This amendment adds contingency language regarding the infrastructure resiliency fund to 4 sections of the bill.  Contingent on SB 7, \$873 million from ESF to be deposited in the Texas Infrastructure Resiliency Fund (TIRF).  \$273 million from ESF to TDEM to provide matching funds for the hazard mitigation grant program. An additional \$273 million, contingent on SB 7, from the TIRF to TDEM to provide additional matching funds for the hazard mitigation grant program.  The amendment strikes contingency from TDEM matching funds for public assistance grant program, this makes \$400 million available with or without the passage of SB 7. And adds an additional section contingent on SB 7 which would appropriate an additional \$400 million to TIRF to provide additional matching funds for public assistance grant program.  Contingent on SB 7 an additional \$200 million from TIRF will transfer to GLO for studies and projects planned to be conducted in the state by Army Corps of Engineers. The concerns stem from the fact that these projects are still undergoing environmental impact studies and the impacts have not yet been determined.
