Rep. Pitts P. 3 830518	This amendment cleans up the language within the Specialty License Plate revenue accrued provisions. It also adds \$1,500,000 to the National Museum of the Pacific War Repairs and Renovations Museum. Finally, this amendment provides funds, salaries, and wages for contractors and full-time employees from the Texas Enterprise Application Modernization capital budget.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Pitts P. 4 830459	This amendment adds a Rider to Article III, which prevents the use of appropriated funds by the UT Board of Regents for transportation or lodging unless they have been confirmed by the senate. This applies to interim Board members appointed by the Governor.	Will of the House
Rep. Pitts P. 5 830458	This amendment adds a rider to the funds appropriated to the University of Texas System and prevents any appropriated funds from being used for investigation of system institutions, their management, or in response to open records requests by system institutions. It also requires the UT System to submit a report to the LBB and the Office of the Governor detailing any investigations conducted.	Will of the House
Rep. Pitts P. 6 830457	This amendment changes the language in Rider 2 to restrict the use of funds appropriated in the Available University fund No. 11. It prevents these funds from being used by the University of Texas System and by the Board of Regents.	Will of the House
Rep. Pitts P. 7 830456	Currently, a state employee who travels within the United States is reimbursed for the cost of lodging and meals, and the reimbursement may not exceed rates based on federal travel regulations. This amendment clarifies the maximum lodging rate cannot be more than \$85.00 per night in Texas cities and counties that do not have a federal per diem rate.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Pitts P. 8 830455	This amendment adds the University of Texas Health Science Center Houston – Texas Heart Institute Stem Cell Program to the Article III Higher Education: Health Related Institutions list and appropriates \$2 million dollars to this program.	<u>Favorable</u>

Rep. Pitts P. 9 830601	This amendment reduces funding from the University of Texas System by \$14,371,225 in Fiscal year 2014 and \$9,140,600 in Fiscal year 2015. This funding is added to the UT System Administration Funding under the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB). THECB cannot use the funds for any other purpose and can only transfer the funds to UT after the Legislative Budget Board and the office of the governor approve the request.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Herrero P. 10 830701	In order to provide supplemental funding for Pre-K, this amendment would take a total of \$28.2 million from the Office of the Attorney General fund and allocate those funds to Pre-K, through the 2014 and 2015 year. The amendment will increase Pre-K funding from \$138.3 million to \$150.1 million in 2014 and to \$154.7 in 2015.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Walle P. 11 830659	Amends Article I by inserting a provision that not later than August 31 of each year of the 2014-2015 biennium, the Office of the Attorney General must report all expenditures of money by the office during the preceding year relating to litigation to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and the Legislature. The report must include expenses relating to litigation brought by the attorney general and litigation in which the attorney general is defending the state and the expenses of any outside counsel hired by the attorney general to assist in the litigation.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Turner, C. P. 12 830444	This amendment requires the Office of the Attorney General to notify the Legislature of all cost-related expenses for cases brought by the Attorney General against the federal government or any agency of the federal government no later than March 1 st and August 31 st of each year in the biennium.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Vo P. 13 830532	This amendment mandates that the Comptroller update the Biennial Revenue Estimate not later than January 15 of each even-numbered year. The updated revenue estimate must include a comparison of the estimate of funds available for general-purpose spending provided to the legislature in January of odd-numbered years with the updated estimate of available revenue, a comparison of the actual and estimated revenue for the preceding biennium, and a comparison of the actual and estimated transfers to the Economic Stabilization Fund.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Farrar P. 14 830615	Requires inclusion in the comptroller's e-newsletter to businesses information about the right of a mother to breastfeed. Despite the right being written in code, many Texas businesses and much of the public believe otherwise. Because of misinformation, mothers are asked to leave public spaces, are subjected to ridicule and even threats. This is an efficient and important way to raise awareness.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Vo P. 15-16 830534	This amendment mandates that the Comptroller shall include in the Tax Exemptions & Tax Incidence, required by Section 403.014 of the Texas Government Code, an itemized list that gives the type of exemption and estimated amount of the benefit.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Vo P. 17 830533	This amendment stipulates that the Comptroller must submit a report to the Legislature each even-numbered year comparing the Biennial Revenue Estimates for the preceding five biennia with the actual revenue collected.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Farias P. 18 830480	The amendment requires the Comptroller of Public Accounts to conduct a Federal Earned Income Tax Study on the number of individuals claiming the credit and the number who are eligible, but do not claim the credit. A report is due on December 1, 2014 to the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Legislature.	<u>Favorable</u>

Rep. Farias P. 19-20 830479	The amendment requires the comptroller to conduct a study on promoting awareness of the federal earned income tax credit. This study will determine the state agencies best suited to provide information to the public on the tax credit and develop strategies for increasing the effectiveness of old programs as well as develop new ones. The comptroller has a deadline of April 1, 2014 to publish the results of this study to the governor, lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house along with at least 3 strategies and programs for implementation to increase awareness of the federal earned income tax credit.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Davis, Y. P. 21 830645	This amendment adds a provision under the Article I appropriations to the comptroller, that a monthly report must be submitted to each member of the legislature that covers the preceding month and includes the amount of money that was deposited in each account in the general revenue fund during the relevant reporting period and the source of that money. It must also include the total amount of money collected by the state during the relevant reporting period and the source of that money. A comparison must be included for the period covered by the report, of the actual revenue collected and the estimated amount of anticipated revenue contained in the comptroller's statement required by the Texas Constitution. If the statement is updated during the reporting period, a complete explanation of the update including the amount and source of the money that is the subject of the update must be included. The first report must be submitted by October 1, 2013.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Walle P. 22 830658	This amendment requires that the comptroller report on the current amount of state debt to the public by posting a continuously updated debt clock on the comptroller's website.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Craddick P. 23 830591	This amendment will provide an additional rider to Fiscal Programs-Comptroller of Public Accounts. From the extent authorized by law, this amendment allows the Comptroller of Public Accounts to take possession of unclaimed property in another state.	Will of the House
Rep. Walle P. 24 830677	This amendment requires the Texas Ethics Commission to conduct a study regarding the fiscal impact of the failure of lobbyists to submit registration forms or lobbying activity reports. By June 1 of each year, the Texas Ethics Commission will submit a report with the names of lobbyists who failed to submit registration forms, activity reports, and unpaid fees, as well as an estimate of the amounts of unpaid fees and expended state resources in relation to not filing forms or reports.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Davis, Y. P. 25 830649	This amendment reduces funding for the Texas Facility Commission (TFC) by \$9,000,000 in fiscal years 2014 and 2015 and increases funding for the Automobile Theft Prevention in each of the fiscal years by \$5,000,000. TFC manages state resources through real estate management, facilities design, and construction. Thousands of automobiles are stolen each year and the Automobile Theft Prevention Program can potentially create a safer state for the average Texas Family.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Lucio P. 26 830626	This amendment reduces the appropriations to the Facilities commission by \$100,000 in each fiscal year. It also reduces appropriations to the Racing Commission of Texas Breed Incentive Program by \$100,000 in both 2014 and 2015 and reduces appropriations to the Racing Commission Central Admin and Other Support Services by \$100,000 in both 2014 and 2015. This amendment also reduces the appropriations to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission by \$100,000 in both 2014 and 2015 and increases the amount appropriated to the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston in 2014 and 2015 for Service Delivery Valley/Border by \$400,000 each year for 2014 and 2015.	<u>Favorable</u>

Rep. Martinez Fischer P. 27-28 830483	This amendment requires the Office of the Governor to conduct a study on driving while intoxicated. The study will monitor the amount of driving fatalities involving intoxicated drivers and monitor and analyze the laws and programs of other states that have been successful in reducing the number of offenses involving driving while intoxicated charges. Based on the study, the office of the governor will then develop a collaborative plan with the Texas Department of Transportation, The Department of Public Safety, and the Department of State Health to make a recommendation to reduce alcoholism, recidivism, and the number of driving while intoxicated offenses committed in Texas. A legislative report is due January 1, 2015 to the Legislature.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Davis, Y. P. 29 830629	This amendment reduces funding for the Governor's Film and Music Marketing fund by \$1,000,000 in FY 2014 and \$1,000,000 in FY 2015 and increases funding for Independent Living Centers by \$500,000 in FY 2014 and \$500,000 in FY 2015.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Leach P. 30 830429	This amendment transfers \$13,135,297, in each FY of 2014-2015, from the Office of the Governor Film and Marketing program to the Texas Women's Health Program, for the purpose of providing primary health care services to women. This amendment eliminates all funding from the general revenue to the Film and Marketing program, a program focused to promote the Film industry in Texas.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Klick P. 31 830452	This amendment reduces appropriations to Women Groups Strategy of the Governor's Commission on Women by \$223,725 for fiscal years 2014-15 and increases appropriations to the Teacher Retirement System Retiree Health Statutory Funds by \$223,725 for fiscal years 2014-15. This amendment would completely strip the Women Groups Strategy from SB 1.	<u>Unfavorable</u>
Rep. Sheffield, R. P. 32 830529	This amendment transfers \$224,871 in fiscal year 2014 and \$212,247 in fiscal year 2015 from the Office of the Governor: Economic Development and Tourism to the Veterans Commission for veteran's employment services.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Simpson P. 33 830692	This amendment adds the University of Texas Health Science Center Houston – Texas Heart Institute Stem Cell Program to the Article III Higher Education: Health Related Institutions list and appropriates \$2 million dollars to this program.	Will of the House
Rep. Lavender P. 34 830686	This amendment adds a new rider that allocates \$15,000,000 for the 2014-2015 biennium in General Revenue funds for the purpose of providing economic and industrial development assistance to the TexAmericas Center Authority. In Article I of the bill Strategy A. on Military Preparedness for Fiscal Year 2014 strikes "\$124,103,995" and substitutes it for "\$139,103,995." For the Criminal Justice Strategy for the fiscal year 2014 "\$96,853,289" is stricken and substituted for "\$81,853,289." While increasing funding for the program is a laudable goal, it should not be funded by reducing criminal justice funding.	Will of the House with Concerns

Rep. Lavender P. 35 830695	This amendment allocates \$15,000,000 for economic and industrial assistance to the TexAmericas Center Authority for the 2014-2015 biennium from funds appropriated within the Office of the Governor. This amendment increases appropriations for military preparedness by \$15,000,000 in fiscal year 2014 and decreases appropriations to the Texas Education Agency Assessment and Accountability System by \$15,000,000 in fiscal year 2014. The funding for this amendment is taken from the money set aside for accountability tests.	Will of the House
Rep. Lavender P. 36 830693	This amendment adds a rider stating that the funds appropriated from the Trusteed Programs Within the Office of the Governor must allocate \$20,000,000 for the 2014-15 biennium in General Revenue funds for the purpose of providing Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grants to defense communities. The Texas Military Preparedness Commission will administer the grant program. The amendment also increases funding to Military Preparedness for fiscal year 2014 from \$124,103,995 to \$144,103,995. It also decreases funding for Criminal Justice from \$96,853,289 to \$76,853,289. While increasing funding for the program is a laudable goal, it should not be funded by reducing criminal justice funding.	<u>Unfavorable</u>
Rep. Lavender P. 37 830694	This amendment allocates \$20,000,000 for providing Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance grants to defense communities responding to a reduction or termination of defense contracts. This amendment also increases appropriations for military preparedness by \$20,000,000 and reduces appropriations to the Texas Education Agency Assessment and Accountability System by 20,000,000.	Will of the House
Rep. Sheffield, R. P. 38 830528	This amendment transfers \$224,871 in fiscal year 2014 and \$212,247 in fiscal year 2015 from the Office of the Governor: Film and Music Marketing to the Veterans Commission for veteran's employment services.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Cortez P. 39 830639	Currently, as proposed, HB 2891 requires the Comptroller to monitor and track intellectual property and commercial equity that the State of Texas has interest or ownership over. This amendment, contingent on the passage of HB 2891, transfers \$500,000, each year of the biennium from the Office of the Governor: Film and Music Marketing to the Comptroller for the monitoring of intellectual property and commercial equity.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Walle P. 40 830689	This amendment zeros out the Texas Enterprise Fund from the Trusteed Programs within the office of the Governor, which provides financial incentives to entities for economic development.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Gonzalez, M. P. 41 830525	For the 2014 fiscal year, this amendment will take out \$322,331 from the Trusteed Programs within the Office of the Governor's State Federal Relations Strategy and \$324,852 for the state fiscal year ending in 2015. These funds will be allocated to the Department of Housing and Community Affairs' B.2.1 Strategy that provides assistance to Colonias, border communities, and nonprofits. Colonia Service Centers will get an increase of \$322,331 for 2014 fiscal year and \$324,852 for 2015 fiscal year.	<u>Favorable</u>

Rep. Thompson, S. P. 42 830500	Rider 7 in Article I allows the Governor to open offices in foreign countries coinciding with market opportunities for Texas businesses. This amendment limits the use of state funds to offices in Mexico and Taiwan.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Martinez Fischer P. 43 830643	This amendment prohibits the use of appropriated funds for health insurance for exempt positions in groups 6, 7, and 8 (Salaries of \$122,500-\$292,000) unless prior written approval by the Governor and LBB is obtained.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Simpson P. 44 830655	This amendment strikes a rider in SB 1, which states that unexpended balances included in amounts appropriated under the Trusteed Programs within the Office of the Governor (TPOG) for fiscal year 2014 are all indeed unexpended and unobligated account balances remaining as of August 31, 2013. Additionally the rider that this amendment strikes that revenue and interest earnings included in amounts appropriated under the TPOG are all revenue and interest earnings accruing during the 2014-15 biennium beginning September 1, 2013.	Will of the House
Rep. Schaefer P. 45 830622	This amends Article I of the bill by adding a provision that reduces the appropriations to the Historical Commission to the cuts of the previous biennium and use those appropriated funds out of general revenue to the Teacher Retirement System for Retiree Health-Statutory Funds, to provide funds for each fiscal year for the health care needs of public education retirees. The article totals and methods of financing are adjusted accordingly. While increasing funding to TRS is a laudable goal, it is inappropriate to pit one important state priority against the other.	<u>Unfavorable</u>
Rep. Gutierrez P. 46 830432	This amendment provides public schools with more funding for academic library grants. In doing so the amendment creates a new provision under the Library & Archives Commission and requires that \$450k and \$2.9 million (\$3.4 million total) be taken out of the General Revenue fund from the Office of the Governor Economic Development and Tourism strategy and appropriated to the new Aid to Local Libraries strategy and committed solely for public schools in 2014 and 2015, respectively.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Cortez P. 47 830640	This amendment takes out \$1,000,000 from the Trusteed Programs within the Office of the Governor Film and Music Marketing Strategy for both the 2014 and 2015 fiscal years. The amendment also increases appropriations to the Library Archives Commission Library Resource Sharing Services by \$1,000,000 for both the 2014 and 2015 fiscal years.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Strama P. 48 830587	This amendment increases GR appropriations to Indirect Administration by \$138,000 in fiscal year 2014 and contingent on the enactment of HB 313 or similar legislation.	Will of the House

Rep. Howard P. 49 830647	This amendment conducts a feasibility study of online voting. Funds are appropriated from the budget for the Secretary of State to research implementing the practice of online voting including a thorough investigation of jurisdiction, anticipated cost and savings to the state, and anticipated increase or decrease in voter turnout and any security issues or other challenges that would come up. This study is due to the Legislature no later than January 13, 2015.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Canales P. 50 830543	This amendment eliminates Rider 10 from Article I. which is a contingency appropriation of \$2,024,000, in the 2014-2015 biennium from General Revenue to the Dedicated Election Improvement Fund. Rider 10 is contingent on the effectiveness of SB 14 by the 82 Legislature and approval of HAVA Federal Funds for the use of voter education purposes related voter identification purposes. SB 14 relates to requiring a voter to present certain proof of identification.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Menendez P. 51 830431	This amendment increases funding to the Texas Veterans Commission in the amount of\$1,201,687 in 2014 and \$1,109,887 in 2015. It coincides with amendment 830433 which reduces appropriations from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board B-On Time strategy by the same amount.	Will of the House
Rep. Zedler P. 52 830620	This amendment allocates extra funding from the General Revenue fund to the Texas Veterans Commission by \$172,095 in 2014 and by \$157,873 in 2015.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Alonzo P. 53 - 55 830556	This amendment requires the Veteran's Commission to launch Veteran's Resource Centers at institutions of higher education in 15 specific regions. These resource centers would serve as a hub for veterans to receive assistance with their educational, career and post-military benefit needs; ensuring the successful completion of their higher education. The counselors at these resource centers would travel regularly throughout their assigned region to each higher education institution to educate veterans on their state and federal education benefits.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Farias P. 56 830478	This amendment limits the salary of the executive director of the Texas Veterans Commission. The salary of the executive director may not exceed \$165,000 a year.	Will of the House
Rep. Sheffield, R. P. 57 830490	This amendment transfers money from the General Revenue fund to the Veterans Entrepreneur Program. \$184,722, of fiscal year 2014, and \$172,098, of fiscal year 2015 will be used to establish and administering the Veteran Entrepreneur Program.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Gonzalez, N. P. 59 830426	This amendment allocates \$2 million of funds that are appropriated to The Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services for the purpose of expanding the Autism Program to the Far West Texas/El Paso region. Currently, the DARS Autism Program has six provider locations that serve the Bexar, Harris, Travis, Tarrant, Denton, Dallas, and surrounding counties, but is lacking services for Far West Texas/El Paso region.	<u>Favorable</u>

Rep. Eiland P. 60 830451	This adds a rider and would direct revenue from unclaimed lottery prize money to the Department of State Health Services for indigent health care reimbursement.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Zerwas P. 61 830563	This amendment adds to Rider 79 to ensure accountability and efficiency within state agencies and facilitate compliance within Local Mental Health Authorities in meeting federal requirements.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Naishtat P. 62 830582	This amendment states that out of the appropriations from the funds to the Department of State Health Services for Strategy B.2.2., Mental Health Services for Children, that \$2,500,000 for each fiscal year is allocated for providing technical assistance and grants to school districts that implement best-practice-based positive youth development programs, mental health promotion programs, early mental health prevention programs, suicide prevention programs, or substance abuse prevention and intervention programs.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Turner, C. P. 63 830565	This amendment transfers \$3,960,000, in each year of the biennium, from the Health and Human Services Abstinence Education fund to the Department of State Health Services Family Planning Services fund from the general revenue fund. Because abstinence is already included in the Department of State Health Services list of Family Planning Services available, this amendment allows for a more fiscally efficient and overall effective way to prevent unintended pregnancy, STI's/medical problems, and promotes the best reproductive health for women.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Bohac P. 64 830584	This amendment requires that of the funds allocated to the Mental Health Services for Children fund, the Department of State Health Services must allocate five percent towards suicide prevention, personal safety, and mental health promotion programs.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Naishtat P. 65 830582	This amends Article III of the bill following the appropriation to the Department of State Health Services by adding that out of funds in Strategy B.2.2., Mental Health Services for Children, for each year of the state fiscal biennium ending August 31, 2015, the department must allocate \$1 million to make grants to community resource coordination groups to provide evidence-based mental health services. They must implement promising practices relating to those services that they determine are necessary and for which no other funding sources are available, to children with complex mental health disorders who are at risk of being removed from their homes or schools. It is the intent of the legislature that the HHSC and the consortium established under the Government Code, identify a procedure for awarding and evaluating these grants.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Herrero P. 66 830673	This amendment prohibits the use of appropriated funds for health insurance for exempt positions in groups 6, 7, and 8 (Salaries of \$122,500-\$292,000) unless prior written approval by the Governor and LBB is obtained.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Farrar P. 67-68 830612	Current law requires that Family Planning Services prioritize distribution of funds to public and non-public recipients based on categories of first, second, and third awards. This amends Rider 65 and allows both non-public and public entities to be eligible for first awards by changing the prioritization requirements. It removes restrictive requirements and broadens eligibility by indicating that first award entities must provide the most economical, efficient, and effective family planning services. It broadens the second award from comprehensive primary and preventive care to family planning services. A third award now includes public and non-public entities including state, counties, local community health clinics, Federally Qualified Health Centers and Baylor College of Medicine clinics. In addition, this amendment promotes efficiency and accountability by requiring the Department of State Health Services to make available to the public the methodology used to allocate funds to entities.	<u>Favorable</u>

Rep. Coleman P. 69-70 830641	This amends Article II of the bill following appropriations to the Department of State Health Services. In regards to Mental Health Services for Adults and Children, and Community Mental Health Services, the DSHS by contract must require that \$172,700,000 in General Revenue funds be used to the extent possible to draw down additional federal funds through the 1115 transformation waiver or other federal matching opportunities, and the funds must be used for mental health services as specified by the department in its performance contracts. The efforts to leverage these funds must be reported to the LBB and Governor by December 1, 2014.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Menendez P. 71 830446	This rider would direct Department of State Health Services to allocate funds to expand or improve community mental health services. Equal distribution of funds to local mental health authorities is recommended under this amendment.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Coleman P. 72 830460	This rider requires the Department of State Health Services to allocate funds to provide HIV medications for inmates in Harris and Travis County Jails. DSHS is prevented from reducing or moving these designated funds to other strategies.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. McClendon P. 73-74 830579	This amends Rider 83 by requiring the Department of State Health Services to include in the ten year plan the need for community-based alternatives to inpatient hospitalization that will help reduce the demands on the state hospital system. The plan must also consider the availability of contracted providers of outpatient services and inpatient mental health facilities other than health hospitals.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Menendez P. 75 830447	This rider would direct Department of State Health Services to allocate funds eliminate the waiting list for services at community mental health centers. If funds cannot be used to eliminate the waiting list, it must then be allocated to local Mental Health Authorities.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Davis, S. P. 76 830449	This rider requires the Department of State Health Services to allocate \$2.5 million for each fiscal year to fund school districts that have effective programs in place for youth development along with early intervention programs for mental health, suicide and substance abuse prevention.	<u>Favorable</u>
Rep. Davis, Y. P. 77 830627	This rider would direct funding by the Department of State Health Services to expand the Texas Health Care-Associated Infection Reporting System. Healthcare associated infections are the most common complications and most preventable causes of death. Data collected from the reporting system will protect and improve patient's outcome in addition to reducing the economic burden to the healthcare system.	<u>Favorable</u>

Rep. Naishtat P. 78 830583	This amendment states that out of the appropriations from the General Revenue fund to the Department of State Health Services for Strategy B.2.2., Mental Health Services for Children, that \$500,000 is allocated for each fiscal year in 2014 and 2015.
