

## **Appendix: 88th Regular Legislative Session Governor's Vetoes**

The deadline to veto bills for the 88th Regular Legislative session was June 18, 2023. Gov. Abbott vetoed 76 bills and one line-item veto in the budget, the most he has ever vetoed. This is also the 2nd highest number of vetoes in Texas history, with former Governor Rick Perry vetoing 83 bills in 2001.

Of the 76 bills vetoed, roughly 53 veto proclamations cited the need to pass property tax relief or "education freedom" related legislation, rather than any reason related to the bill. Below is an appendix of the bills vetoed, the 3rd reading vote in both chambers, and the veto proclamation.
